There will be great live music, food, and unique finds from more than 150 vendors, earning our reputation for being Baltimore's biggest and best flea market. Also, around midday, the Pagoda will be open. The flea market is also a major fundraising event for BHA; proceeds fund our neighborhood activities, including greening projects and safety initiatives, as well as supporting local nonprofits, like the Friends of Patterson Park and our two preK-8 schools.

BUTCHERS HILL FLAGS

The Butchers Hill Association is looking into the possibility of getting custom Butchers Hill flags made for neighbors to purchase. They will be 3'x5' white flags with the purple Butchers Hill logo on both sides. These will be on a preorder basis and we are hoping to get a minimum of twenty-five orders to keep costs down. As these are custom flags, we're looking at a price range between \$66 and \$90, depending on how many are ordered. The more orders that are placed, the cheaper the flags will be. We are still finalizing details, so these numbers are subject to change.

STREETSCAPE UPDATE

Don't Lift a Finger and Go Native for Butchers Hill

LOTS (Lights on the Street), a new initiative by the Crime Prevention and Streetscape committees, has been established to ensure every street in our neighborhood is safe and well lit at night. A simple change to a dawn-to-dusk switch and conversion to LED bulbs will make this happen without lifting a finger! BHA is subsidizing the cost of the automatic switch and has contracted with a licensed electrician to provide three different conversion scenarios at a fixed price. No exterior fixture or need a new one? No problem. Contact the Streetscape committee (see page 2) if you are interested in getting your block brighter and safer the easy way. If you would like to donate to help offset the cost of the initiative, see the Donations article.

Going native in Halcott Square? No, not tropical island native, but we're replacing invasive or imported plants with natives that provide food and shelter for our native birds and insect pollinators. The park's over-grown yew hedge, native to North Africa and Europe, will be replaced with an attractive northern bayberry hedge, native to our mid-Atlantic region. It will provide berries for migrating and local birds besides attracting over one hundred species of moths and butterflies.

Other places in Butchers Hill where you can see native plants, pollinators, and birds flourishing are the three rain gardens; our street trees (flowering red bud, red maple, red oak, sycamore); your neighbors' Audubon-certified, bird-friendly gardens; and the unit block S Madeira Street.

Did you know that even small urban bird-friendly and pollinator-friendly gardens and containers help ensure our native species have the food and shelter they require to survive? For more information, see www.audubon.org/bird/at-home. If you are interested in purchasing native plants for yourself, consider purchasing from Aubudon at the BHA Flea Market on May 12.
